## Performance



#### Performance

Based on transaction prices, the fund's return was 0.90%.

The positive return was driven by a tightening of credit spreads. Index spreads tightened during the month of May, ending the month at 156 bps versus 171 bps at the end of April. The index excess return was therefore +24 bps. Underlying government bond yields moved higher during the month, which had a negative impact on the total return. Performance attribution versus the benchmark is split into beta positioning and issuer selection, in line with our investment process. The relative performance of the underlying portfolio, measured gross of fees, was +10 basis points. The beta overweight position contributed positively, while issuer selection also contributed positively to the performance. The best-performing individual positions, on a risk-adjusted basis, were Zurich (defensive highly rated insurer), Nordea (defensive and highly rated bank) and Unicaja (cheap Spanish bank). The largest detractor from the performance was the beta hedge via the iTraxx Subordinated Financials Index.

## Market development

The market rally that began in April, following a more moderate tone on tariffs from the US government, continued through May. By the end of May, credit spreads had returned to levels close to the tight conditions observed earlier in the year, prior to Liberation Day. Although the tariff pause has been extended for now and the Trump administration appears open to negotiations, there remains a steady stream of new initiatives and proposals. Notably, tariffs on steel and aluminum imports have been increased to 50%. Additionally, there is ongoing uncertainty regarding how foreign investors and companies will be taxed under Section 899 of the 'One Big Beautiful Bill Act'. In the treasury markets, investors are expressing concern about the potential impact of the administration's policies on the long-term fiscal sustainability of the US. However, for the time being, markets seem to be discounting these risks, operating under the assumption that the government will eventually moderate its plans. Meanwhile, European banks and insurance companies appear largely unaffected by these concerns and continue to demonstrate strong fundamentals.

## **Expectation of fund manager**

Credit spreads for European financial companies are still relatively attractive. At the same time, the financial sector is fundamentally doing well. Balance sheets look robust after years of deleveraging and cyclically, the sector is benefiting from higher interest rates. Going forward, we expect profitability to plateau at a higher level than observed in the period between the great financial crisis and the Covid-19 crisis, as we do not expect central banks to move back to periods of zero interest rates, while at the same time banks have made strong progress in terms of improving their underlying profitability. A such, the resilience of banks to external shocks has greatly improved. Appetite for bonds with higher yields remains strong, as investors like to lock in attractive yield levels. In recent months, a large number of bank CoCos have been issued and order books for those deals were again large. We are becoming more selective in participating in new bond issues, as spreads have tightened. We continue to target a small overweight beta positioning in the fund, as we see opportunities to buy bonds at attractive levels, in primary or secondary markets

## Subordination allocation

The largest part of the portfolio is invested in Tier-2 debt. About three quarter of these bonds are issued by banks, the remainder is issued by insurance companies. The categories hybrid and subordinated mostly contain subordinated debt issued by insurance companies. The exposure under Tier 1 mostly relates to bank CoCos. The exposure to senior bonds mainly consists of German Bunds, though we also hold senior bank bonds issued by banks like mBank, Bank Millennium and Banca Transylvania.

#### **ESG** Important information

#### Sustainability

The fund incorporates sustainability in the investment process via exclusions, ESG integration, a minimum allocation to ESG-labeled bonds, and engagement. The fund does not invest in credit issuers that are in breach of international norms or where activities have been deemed detrimental to society following Robeco's exclusion policy. Financially material ESG factors are integrated in the bottom-up security analysis to assess the impact on the issuer's fundamental credit quality. In the credit selection the fund limits exposure to issuers with an elevated sustainability risk profile. Furthermore, the fund invests at least 5% in green, social, sustainable, and/or sustainability-linked bonds. Lastly, where issuers are flagged for breaching international standards in the ongoing monitoring, the issuer will become subject to engagement.



## Sustainalytics ESG Risk Rating

The Portfolio Sustainalytics ESG Risk Rating chart displays the portfolio's ESG Risk Rating. This is calculated by multiplying each portfolio component's Sustainalytics ESG Risk Rating by its respective portfolio weight. The Distribution across Sustainalytics ESG Risk levels chart shows the portfolio allocations broken into Sustainalytics' five ESG risk levels: negligible (0-10), low (10-20), medium (20-30), high (30-40) and severe (40+), providing an overview of portfolio exposure to the different ESG risk levels. Index scores are provided alongside the portfolio scores, highlighting the portfolio's ESG risk level compared to the index.





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#### **Environmental Footprint**

Environmental footprint expresses the total resource consumption of the portfolio per mUSD invested. Each assessed company's footprint is calculated by normalizing resources consumed by the company's enterprise value including cash (EVIC). We aggregate these figures to portfolio level using a weighted average, multiplying each assessed portfolio constituent's footprint by its respective position weight. For comparison, index footprints are shown besides that of the portfolio. The equivalent factors that are used for comparison between the portfolio and index represent European averages and are based on third-party sources combined with own estimates. As such, the figures presented are intended for illustrative purposes and are purely an indication. Only holdings mapped as corporates are included in the figures.



### **SDG Impact Alignment**

This distribution across SDG scores shows the portfolio weight allocated to companies with a positive, negative and neutral impact alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) based on Robeco's SDG Framework. The framework utilizes a three-step approach to assess a company's impact alignment with the relevant SDGs and assign a total SDG score. The score ranges from positive to negative impact alignment with levels from high, medium or low impact alignment. This results in a 7-step scale from -3 to +3. For comparison, index figures are provided alongside that of the portfolio. Only holdings mapped as corporates are included in the figures.

#### **ESG Labeled Bonds**

The ESG-labeled bond chart displays the portfolio's exposure to ESG-labeled bonds. Specifically, green bonds, social bonds, sustainability bonds, and sustainability-linked bonds. This is calculated as a sum of weights for those bonds in the portfolio that have one of above mentioned labels. Index exposure figures are provided alongside the portfolio exposure figures, highlighting the difference with the index.

#### Engagement

Robeco distinguishes between three types of engagement. Value Engagement focuses on long-term issues that are financially material and/or are causing adverse sustainability impacts. The themes can be broken into Environmental, Social, Governance, or Voting-related. SDG Engagement aims to drive a clear and measurable improvement in a company's SDG contribution. Enhanced engagement is triggered by misconduct and focuses on companies severely breaching internationals standards. The report is based on all companies in the portfolio for which engagement activities have taken place during the past 12 months. Note that companies may be under engagement in multiple categories simultaneously. While the total portfolio exposure excludes double counting, it may not equal the sum of individual category exposures.



#### Investment policy

Robeco Financial Institutions Bonds is an actively managed fund that mainly invests in subordinated euro-denominated bonds issued by financial institutions. The selection of these bonds is based on fundamental analysis. The fund's objective is to provide long-term capital growth. The fund offers a diversified exposure to subordinated bonds issued by banks and insurance companies and the focus of the fund is, in general, towards higher rated issuers (investment grade).

The fund promotes E&S (i.e. Environmental and Social) characteristics within the meaning of Article 8 of the European Sustainable Finance Disclosure Regulation, integrates sustainability risks in the investment process and applies Robeco's Good Governance policy. The fund applies sustainability indicators, including but not limited to, normative, activity-based and region-based exclusions, and engagement.

#### Fund manager's CV

Jan Willem de Moor is Portfolio Manager Investment Grade with a focus on European and financial bonds. Working together with the Insurance and Pensions Solutions team, he is also responsible for the management of buy & maintain portfolios. Prior to joining Robeco in 2005, he worked at the Dutch Medical professionals' pension fund as an Equity Portfolio Manager and at SNS Asset Management as an Equity Portfolio Manager. Jan Willem has been active in the industry since 1994. He holds a Master's in Economics from Tilburg University. Jan Willem Knoll is Portfolio Manager Investment Grade in the Credit team. He joined the Credit team in 2016 as Analyst for the Financials sector. Previously, Jan Willem headed the Financials Equity sell-side research team at ABN AMRO. He started his career in the industry in 1999 at APG, where he held several positions including Portfolio Manager of global insurance portfolio pan-European financials portfolios. Jan Willem holds a Master's in Business Economics from the University of Groningen and he is a CFA® Charterholder.

#### Team info

The Robeco Financial Institutions Bonds fund is managed within Robeco's credit team, which consists of nine portfolio managers and twenty-three credit analysts (of which four financials analysts). The portfolio managers are responsible for the construction and management of the credit portfolios, whereas the analysts cover the team's fundamental research. Our analysts have long term experience in their respective sectors which they cover globally. Each analyst covers both investment grade and high yield, providing them an information advantage and benefiting from inefficiencies that traditionally exist between the two segmented markets. Furthermore, the credit team is supported by dedicated quantitative researchers and fixed income traders. On average, the members of the credit team have an experience in the asset management industry of seventeen years, of which eight years with Robeco.

#### Fiscal product treatment

The fund is established in Luxembourg and is subject to the Luxembourg tax laws and regulations. The fund is not liable to pay any corporation, income, dividend or capital gains tax in Luxembourg. The fund is subject to an annual subscription tax ('tax d'abonnement') in Luxembourg, which amounts to 0.05% of the net asset value of the fund. This tax is included in the net asset value of the fund. The fund can in principle use the Luxembourg treaty network to partially recover any withholding tax on its income.

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#### Sustainability images

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
