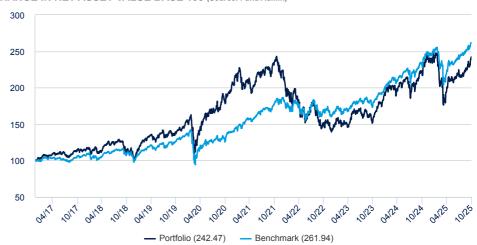

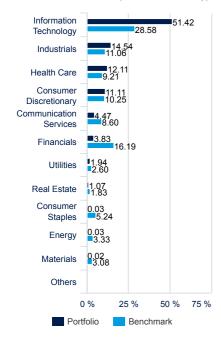

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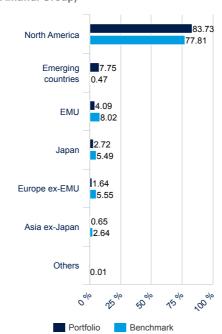

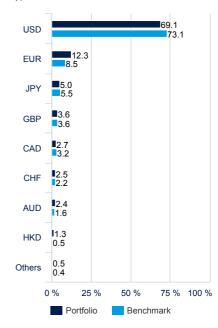

MANAGER'S COMMENT

October was marked by a major political deadlock in the United States, with a prolonged government shutdown due to the lack of agreement on the 2026 budget between Democrats and Republicans. This stalemate, which partially paralyzes the administration, weighs on the confidence of economic and political actors. Volatility experienced temporary spikes, with the VIX reaching its highest level since last April at 29.0 before falling back to 17.4. Gold rose early in the month, reaching a peak of \$4,380 per ounce, before retreating to \$4,000 following a de-escalation of tensions between the United States and China. Despite these uncertainties, equity markets showed resilience. The S&P 500 rose by 3.4%, supported by strong earnings in the technology and financial sectors and by a reduction in tariffs between China and the United States. The Nasdaq outperformed with a gain of 5.8%, buoyed by renewed enthusiasm around artificial intelligence. In Europe, the CAC 40 gained 2.9%, benefiting notably from the automotive and luxury sectors, stimulated by signs of recovering Chinese demand. The DAX, meanwhile, was flat at +0.3%, weighed down by the persistent weakness of industrial exporters.

In the United States, despite the lack of economic data due to the shutdown, the Federal Reserve cut rates by 25 basis points, bringing the target range to 3.75-4.00%. Political uncertainty, renewed trade tensions with China, and fragility in some regional banks weighed on activity. The ADP report revealed a decline of 32,000 jobs in September, while the ISM manufacturing (49.1) and services (50.0) surveys showed a marked slowdown. Consumer sentiment also deteriorated, reaching its lowest level since the "Liberation Day." Overall inflation slightly increased to 3.0% (from 2.9%), while core inflation fell to 3.0% (from 3.1%), reflecting a moderate impact of tariffs, offset by easing rents and automotive prices.

In the eurozone, third-quarter GDP grew by 0.2%, confirming the recovery anticipated by leading indicators. The composite PMI rose to 52.2 in October, its highest level since the first quarter of 2024. Consumer confidence also strengthened. Inflation stood at 2.2% in September, and in line with expectations, the ECB kept its deposit rate unchanged at 2.0%.

On the sectoral front, Information Technology (+8.4%) and Health Care (+5.0%) posted the best performances. These sectors benefited from strong earnings, notably among the major hyperscalers, and strong momentum. Conversely, the Real Estate sector, sensitive to interest rate fluctuations, declined by 0.7%. Finally, the Materials sector (-1.0%) recorded the weakest performance, penalized by disappointing economic data.

Key highlights from the Disruptive world this month:

-OpenAl has completed a recapitalization that creates a for-profit public benefit corporation, OpenAl Group, controlled by a non-profit parent, the OpenAl Foundation. The Foundation will own 26% of the for-profit (with a warrant for more if the company grows) and appoint its board; Microsoft will hold roughly 27% (about \$135 billion valuation) and investors and employees will hold the remaining 47%. The new structure removes the equity limits of OpenAl's prior non-profit status, allowing the company to raise funds and make acquisitions. Microsoft's deal extends its IP rights to OpenAl models through 2032 and requires independent verification if OpenAl ever claims to have achieved AGI. The recapitalization followed large conditional investments (including a reported \$30 billion commitment from SoftBank) and overcame legal challenges, notably from Elon Musk. California and Delaware attorneys general permitted the conversion with conditions; California specifically requires continued measures to mitigate Al risks to teens and others. OpenAl says regulator discussions led to changes that improved the plan.

-Aurora added a 600-mile driverless route from Fort Worth to El Paso, its second commercial route, and reported over 100,000 driverless miles on public roads with five self-driving trucks since launching commercial service in May. The company plans to expand to Phoenix by year-end. Initial service began on a Dallas-to-Houston route with customers including Hirschbach Motor Lines and Uber Freight; customers on the El Paso route include Hirschbach and Russell Transport. Aurora introduced next-generation hardware made by Fabrinet for Volvo VNL Autonomous trucks, claiming better durability, doubled lidar range to 1,000 meters, improved sensor cleaning, and half the cost; it plans to build hundreds of these trucks in 2026. A higher-volume hardware suite developed with Aumovio is slated for 2027, with plans to scale to tens of thousands of self-driving trucks.

The fund delivered strong absolute and relative returns in October, outperforming its benchmark. This performance was driven by contributions from several of the portfolio's long-term thematic pillars. The Earth dimension remained the primary driver, led by energy-efficiency theme with names such as Hitachi and by cleantech themes. First Solar, NextEra and Constellation made notable contributions as the economy increasingly seeks additional energy capacity to serve data centers and other power-intensive industries in the years ahead. The digital economy dimension also contributed meaningfully, with Big Data exposures (AMD, TSMC, Applied Materials, Snowflake) and cloud theme (Twilio, Confluent) benefiting from a robust earnings season.

The Life Sciences & Health Care dimension gained from a rebound in MedTech theme, especially Intuitive Surgical, and from generally resilient biotech performance. Intuitive rose about 14% after reporting that Da Vinci 5 procedure volumes accelerated to 19%, 300 basis points above expectations, together with systems placements that exceeded forecasts across regions.

Industry 4.0 was broadly stable. Within the portfolio, weakness in Mobility names (Uber, BYD) was offset by strength in the Security segment, including Rocket Lab and CrowdStrike.

During the month we took profits in Apple, Lumentum and Johnson Controls; which was replaced with Trane Technologies to increase exposure to the residential market. We also raised our exposure to infrastructure software by adding Datadog.
